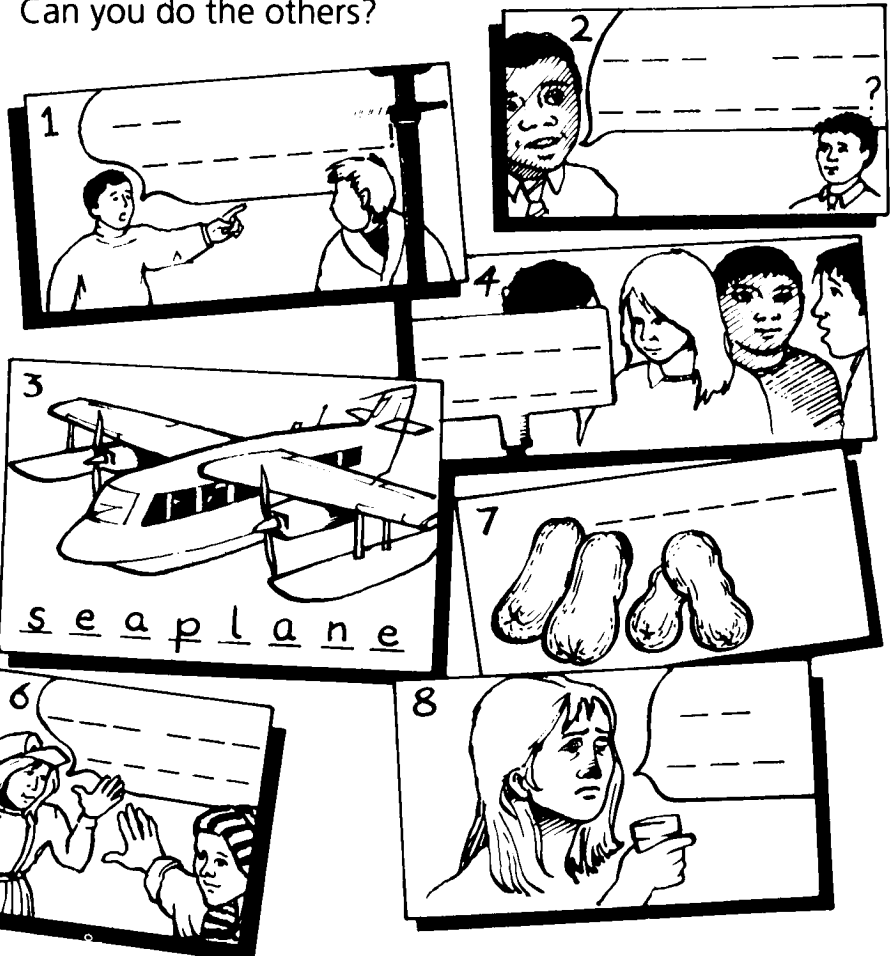
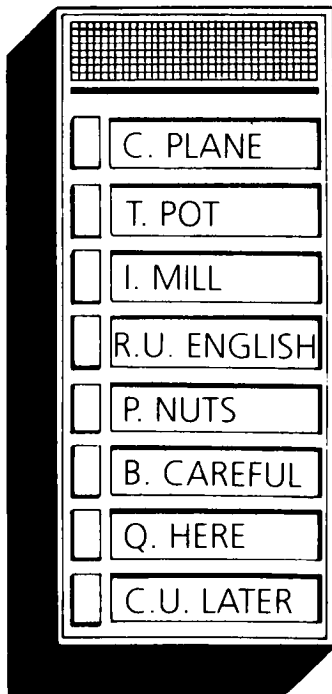
The letter	<input type="text"/>	sounds like the word	tea .

like a word or a phrase.

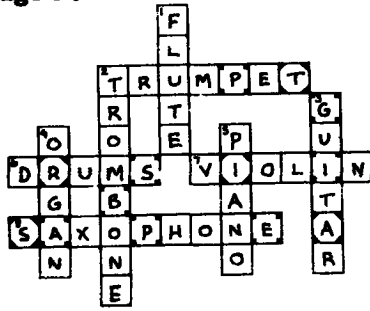
For example, *C. Plane* sounds like *seaplane*.

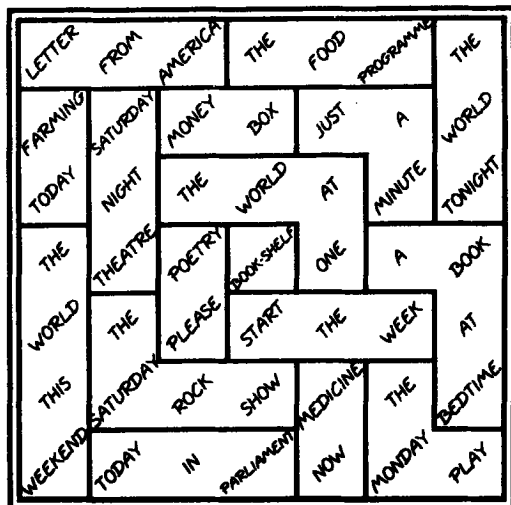
To make their *ing*-form, most verbs just add *ing* (studying, spelling, starting, going, opening, telling, doing, eating, listening, working, helping).

Verbs ending with a consonant + *e* lose the *e* (leave – leaving, take – taking, hope – hoping, skate – skating).

Some verbs double the final consonant (get – getting, swim – swimming, run – running, stop – stopping).

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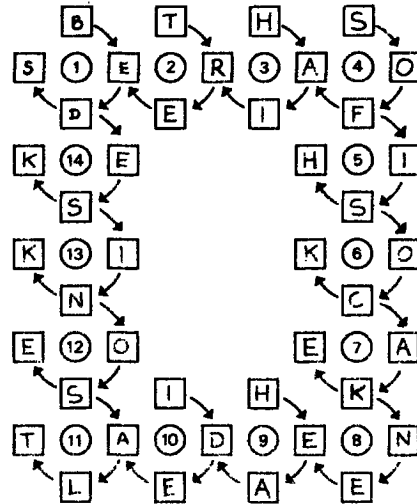
