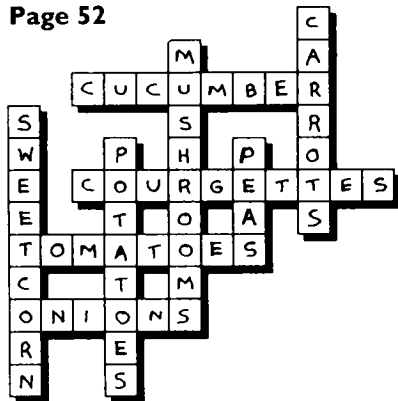

Remember: Most verbs add *ed* (walked, washed, painted, listened, opened). Verbs ending with a consonant + *y* use *ied* (study – studied). Verbs ending with *e* just add *d* (danced, phoned, typed, arrived, skated). Some verbs double the final consonant (stop–stopped).

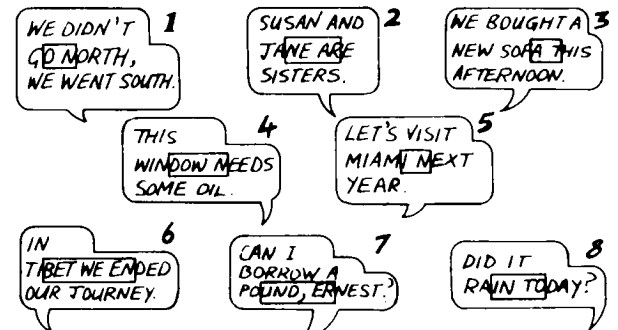

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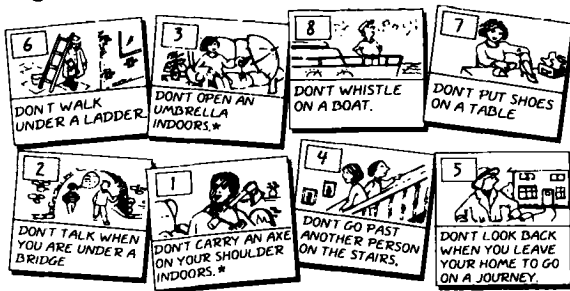
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2. Of the six verbs (*lose, close, choose, put, shut, cut*), the two with the same meaning are *close* and *shut*.

Don't Do It – It's Unlucky!

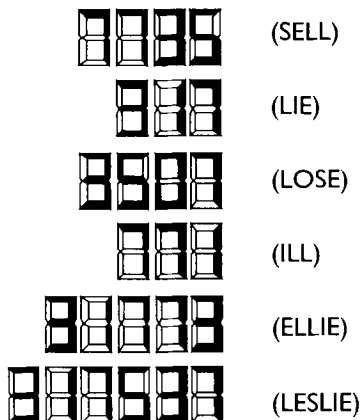
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(*The word 'indoors' means 'inside a building'. The opposite is 'outdoors'.)

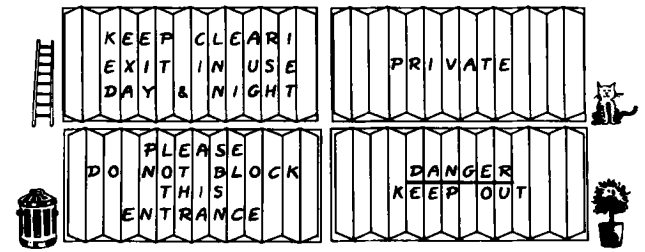

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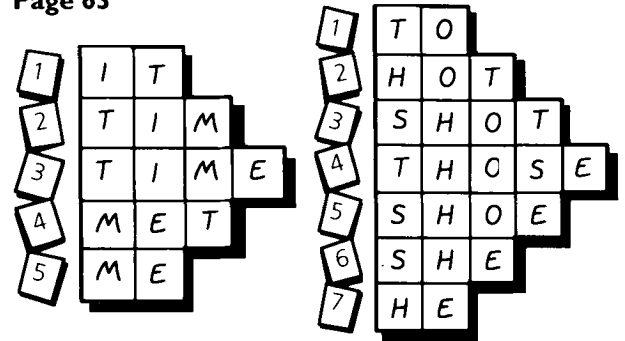
