Groupwork: jigsaw reading, speaking

AIM

To put a set of sentences in order so as to make a story, and to then discuss dress codes at work.

PREPARATION

Decide how many students you want in each group, from three to twelve. Make one copy of the worksheet for each group and cut it up as indicated.

TIME

15-25 minutes

PROCEDURE

- 1 Ask the students how people usually dress in their company/ies. What would happen if someone came, for example, in jeans and a polo shirt? Is there a written dress code?
- 2 Tell the students they are going to do a speaking activity about clothes at work.
- 3 Divide the class into groups of up to 12 students.
- 4 Give out the strips with the sentences from the story: an equal number of strips to each group member.
- 5 Write these rules on the board:
*Put the 12 sentences in order to make a story.
Complete the task by speaking English.
Do not show the sentences to each other: read them out.*
- 6 Ask the students to begin.
- 7 When they have finished, check their work.
- 8 Ask what they think are the advantages and disadvantages of strict written dress codes from the point of view of the company and the employee.

FOLLOW-UP 1

Students write the story, or a similar one, in their own words.

FOLLOW-UP 2

Students write a dress code for their company, or the dress code they would have if they had their own company.
