- 6 When my kids were little, holidaying at home was often easier than organising nap times and car trips. They were happy to spend days by the pool and eat a picnic dinner before going to bed. - 7 Without the structure of school or work, we spend our days reading books, watching TV series and cleaning. While friends spend weeks at the beach, posting photos that sometimes make me jealous, we stay up late and catch up with friends who are also in town.

8 After the pandemic, we were all desperate to leave our houses and towns. But that feeling is now gone, and I'm enjoying the thought of staying home and catching up with friends who I never have time to see. But my favourite thing to do if I'm holidaying at home is to buy a jigsaw puzzle, clear the dining table and open the box of pieces, making a start on the edge. There I'll sit for hours, refilling my cup of tea, the cat circling my feet, as I work my way through the scene and forget time.


