



Dead satellites are filling space with trash. That could affect Earth's magnetic field

Level 3: Advanced

Article summary: The article discusses the rubbish produced by satellites and its potential effect on Earth's magnetic field.

Time: 60 minutes

Skills: Reading, Speaking, Writing

Language focus: Collocations

Materials needed: One copy of the worksheet

per student

1. Warmer

a. Ask students to work in pairs and discuss the questions. Encourage them to give reasons for their opinions. After a couple of minutes, hold a brief discussion with the whole group so every pair can share their views.

2. Key words

a. Ask students to work individually or in pairs and complete the sentences using the words given. Tell them all the words appear in the article, so they can see them in context if they are unsure about their meaning. Allow some minutes for students to check answers in pairs or groups of three before checking with the whole group.

3. Comprehension check

a. Students first read the statements and decide whether they are true or false according to the article. Students correct the false sentences to make them true. They may do this in different ways, e.g. in item 1, they may say, 'There are currently nearly 10,000 active satellites,' or similar.

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5. Discussion

 a. Students discuss the statements related to the article and give their reasons and justifications for each answer, referring to their own experiences or knowledge wherever possible.

- b. Elicit the conventions of essay writing (academic purposes, formal style: no contractions, sophisticated, formal language).
 Then ask students to use the lists of pros and cons they created to write an essay on the topic, also including their own opinions.
